

# Special Exhibitions at the Geffrye Museum

## Autumn 2001

### **After The Fire: London Furniture 1666-1714** **13 November 2001 to 3 March 2002**

This exhibition traces an extraordinary period in the history of English furniture. The restoration of the monarchy, the rebuilding of London after the Great Fire and the development of trade with America, the West Indies and the Far East all combined to create an expanding economy. The rise of a prosperous middle class in London created increasing demand for high-quality goods in the latest styles, not least in furniture.

*After the Fire* is the result of recent research into both the furniture of the period and the economic context of the London furniture trade. Displays will include themes such as the rise of the cabinet maker, the role of upholsterers and cane-chair makers, and oriental influences. Hands-on samples will explain the techniques of joints, veneers and japanning. Exhibits will include colourful and extremely beautiful pieces, many of which have been selected from National Trust houses and private collections, and will be seen together for the first time.

The need to rebuild London after the Great Fire accelerated changes in the design of town houses, their interior arrangement and the nature and style of furniture. The exhibition will show how London's economic growth attracted protestant immigrants from the Continent, encouraging the spread of continental skills and fashions in furniture, and how exotic imports from the Far East introduced new ideas in furniture, interiors and decoration. By the end of Queen Anne's reign in 1714, London's furniture makers could supply the needs of the richest and most fashion-conscious clients, and the Joiners' Company was able to boast that their work had 'arrived at so great a perfection as exceeds all *Europe*'.

The exhibition has been guest curated by Dr Adam Bowett, whose book *English Furniture from Charles II to Queen Anne, 1660-1714* will be published in early 2002.

### **Stripey Drawers from Wales and Wales** **Tuesday 13 November 2001– Sunday 3 March 2002**

A selection of exquisite cabinets made by the highly-regarded furniture makers Rod and Alison Wales will be shown in the Design Centre as a modern counterpoint to the 17<sup>th</sup>-century cabinets displayed in the exhibition *After the Fire*. Made to individual commission, each of the pieces in the STRIPE series uses contrasting woods to create the distinctive stripes which have become one of the hallmarks of a Wales and Wales cabinet.
